Reformation Sunday

November 1^{st} is All Saints Day, also known as All Hallows. Since at least the 4^{th} century, Christians have been annually celebrating the saints of history and their own deceased. The early Christians held the celebration on the first Sunday after Pentecost. In the 8^{th} century, the Pope moved the date to November 1^{st} .

During the Middle Ages, it was widely thought that the spirits of the dead (ghosts) roamed the earth on All Hallows Eve (October 31, aka Halloween), the night before All Hallows. Many people thought that this was a propitious time to pray to the saints and ask them to intercede for them with God.

Martin Luther was strongly opposed to this practice. He believed that we do not need to pray to saints. Rather, we are all free to pray directly to God. He expressed his view by nailing his 95 Theses, his objections to the teaching and practices of the Catholic Church, to the church door in Wittenberg on October 31^{st} , 1517.

Luther's protest has been widely hailed as the start of the Protestant Reformation. Thus, October 31st is known as Reformation Day. Reformation Sunday is the Sunday before October 31st.
