Ash Wednesday begins the 40 day season of Lent. A journey from the ashes of death to resurrected life. A day of prayer and reflection.

We will begin this special day with the Imposition of Ashes. The ashes are a traditional sign of mourning and repentance. They are meant to remind people of their mortality.

Lent culminates in Holy Week. Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday being the most significant days. Lent ends on Easter Sunday when we commemorate the resurrection of Jesus.

We invite you to join us on our Lenten Journey 2025!

First, what is Lent all about? Lent originated as a time of training, training of candidates for baptism at Easter, renewal training for the faithful, and redemptive training for those excommunicated as they were invited back into the community of faith. A core component of these training processes is repentance. Many people view repentance as an introspection that leads a person to be sorry for past wrongdoings and resolve to be a better person. This form of repentance can be done by anyone, of any religion, and even no religion. For us, as it was for believers in the early church, the Lenten journey of repentance is so much more.



Repentance is not merely an intellectual exercise of self-help, but a profound moral and spiritual transformation, that changes our minds, changes our hearts, changes our life trajectory, by fixing our primary orientation on the Triune God and committing to live into this new way of resurrection life. Repentance is looking away from ourselves and away from the deceptive but convincingly enticing answers of the world. Repentance is earnestly seeking to know the God who created all things, in the resurrected person of Jesus Christ, through the power of the Holy Spirit. The active living out of this repentant life is done in community.

Our Lenten journey is being shaped to help us deepen our relationships with one another and with God, to learn with and from one another what God is saying to us and who God is calling us to be, and to resist worldly temptations that provide comfortable answers so that we might explore the underlying issues, engage the rich theology of those issues, and encounter the risen Christ in the everyday and ordinary. The first temptation, which I have already heard from some people, is to believe this is too difficult or requires extensive biblical knowledge. Our Lenten journey forward is about reflecting back on the basics of faith and following Jesus. We simply need to trust and follow.

Our Lenten journey is being shaped around our regular Sunday worship services, a few key practices that help us to focus on God, weekly readings through the book of Acts, questions from Paul's instructions to the church in Ephesus (see Acts 19) that call us to action, and mid-week gatherings to listen and learn what God might be saying about all of this together.

This multifaceted engagement will teach us the importance of listening to the biblical stories of the past to learn how our identity needs to be based on being Children of God, rather than the multitude of identities presented to us by the world. We will learn how Jesus embraced lament for God's people while maintaining his primary focus toward the cross and fulfilling God's purposes. We will learn what it means to be living a Kingdom way of life, connecting the biblical stories with the everyday and ordinary moments of our lives, encountering and embracing the unconditional and limitless grace of God, and being actively engaged as participants in the Body of Christ today.




Lenten Soup/Bible Study Lunches!

Soup is on the Menu. You are welcome to bring bread/crackers or a dessert. You do not need to bring food to join us for lunch. Just bring yourself!

A free-will donation will be taken at each to help cover the costs of food.

There are two options for the mid-week gatherings: one at church around the noon hour and another at Bob's Pizza (meeting in the Just Love Café) in the evening. Both will include a time of worship, reading scripture, prayer, and options to share food. The noon option will start in the sanctuary (and available to watch on Zoom if unable to attend in person) and then move to the Fellowship Hall for soup and discussion. The evening option will overlap the worship and discussion with the option of eating. A free-will donation will be taken at each to help cover the costs of food. All are invited to share in the meal, without concern for the cost. This is part of learning to live and share with one another as the Body of Christ.



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The Acts 19-Ephesus portion of our Lenten journey connects to the overarching process your Session has tasked me to facilitate, discerning and implementing an appropriate organizational structure for our church. This active engagement perspective of repentance, committing to live into the new way of resurrection life, requires repentance from what I refer to as the ways in which "the institutional clergy industry" has stolen the richness and joy of sharing together in ministry from the body of Christ. There is no division of clergy and laity in the New Testament! We find in the early church everyone is encouraged, and even expected, to find their place in the movement. One of the ways to engage in a more biblical model of being the Body of Christ, is by exploring the model given to us in Ephesians 4:11-16.

¹¹ He gave some apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers. ¹² His purpose was to equip God's people for the work of serving and building up the body of Christ ¹³ until we all reach the unity of faith and knowledge of God's Son. God's goal is for us to become mature adults—to be fully grown, measured by the standard of the fullness of Christ. ¹⁴ As a result, we aren't supposed to be infants any longer who can be tossed and blown around by every wind that comes from teaching with deceitful scheming and the tricks people play to deliberately mislead others. ¹⁵ Instead, by speaking the truth with love, let's grow in every way into Christ, ¹⁶ who is the head. The whole body grows from him, as it is joined and held together by all the supporting ligaments. The body makes itself grow in that it builds itself up with love as each one does its part.

We will explore what these various roles meant for the early church and how they might be embraced to reshape how we live out being the Body of Christ in this time and place. Here are a few definitions to briefly get us started: an APOSTLE connects with the "sentness" of the church; a PROPHET connects with questioning and reforming the church; an EVANGELIST communicates and cultivates relationships within the church; a PASTOR protects and provides experiences of community within the church; and a TEACHER explains and instructs the truths of Scripture with the church.

As we unpack the possibilities of how these various roles are lived out in today's world, we will be asking everyone to commit to exploring and experimenting with at least one of these areas. We will be providing colored paper that you can print your name along with an idea of how you feel Christ has given you specific gifts for this area of ministry and/or specific examples of how you see this area of ministry enacted in the world today. Our hope is that as we deepen our relationships and engagement with scripture, we will be able to encourage one another in love to embrace these various forms of ministry and display the unity of the Spirit to a world that is being torn apart.



For more than 75 years, One Great Hour of Sharing has provided us a way to share God's love with our neighbors in need. In fact, OGHS is the single, largest way Presbyterians come together every year to work toward a better world. The One Great Hour of Sharing collection is taken during Lent each year, ending on Palm Sunday. Funds from the One Great Hour of Sharing collection are divided between the Presbyterian Disaster Fund, The Hunger Project, and Self Development of People. March 2 Sermon Discussions

Sermon Discussion is an opportunity for discussion of the scripture passages. Facilitators help to create an atmosphere where participants can explore their thoughts and feelings about the issues and topics presented by the scriptures of the day. Anyone who wants to enjoy an open and caring environment for exploring their faith is welcome.

March 9 Lenten Journey and Practices

Pastor Craig will give a brief overview of our Lenten Journey and share basic instructions and purposes for our Lenten Practices. He will explain the connections between the Sunday scripture readings, the weekly readings in Acts, and the Ephesians 4 discernment process. This all is structured to help us become more aware of God's presence in our lives and to generate conversations about discerning the best organizational structure for our congregation. We invite everyone to be engaged in some way with our Lenten journey.

March 16 Blandine House

Blandine House is a 90-day residential treatment center for adult men with alcohol and drug issues. They focus on counseling, therapy, education, and goal setting. Blandine staff consists of licensed substance abuse counselors, resident house managers and an executive director. The extended "Blandine Family," composed of former residents and members of the 12-step community, freely offer their time and enthusiasm about recovery to the gentlemen of Blandine both informally and formally.

Since 2013 the Community of Fond du Lac has come together to pack nutritionally complete meals specially formulated for malnourished children all over the world.

91% of donations go to the food program. 99% of food shipments reach their destination---the starving children.

Our goal for the March 8, 2025, MobilePack is to pack 139,968 meals at a cost of \$41,000 utilizing 600 volunteers. We have already raised over \$23,400 towards this goal. There are two ways

that you can help with the MobilePack campaign— a monetary donation and/or volunteering your time to pack the meals. Each meal costs 29 cents so every donation makes an impact. A donation of \$106 will feed a child for an entire year.
