Reflections

"Putting Faith into Action"

⁵ The apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith!' ⁶The Lord replied, 'If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea", and it would obey you.

Luke 17:5-6

A person never really knows how much faith they have, until it is put to use. When everything is under control, without challenges or significant needs, we are not living by faith – we are living by our own capability. In those eras, when the people of God had been managing God's work by their own strength and capability, there has been a steady decline in the gospel and message. This was seen shortly after the first century of following Jesus. A letter was sent to Claudius, Caesar by a servant dispatched to investigate, among other things, the movement called "Christian" saying: "You needn't trouble yourself for there are far many who 'were' Christian than who are now." This was a period of relative quiet and stability for the church. Soon after a combination of plagues, civil unrest, and changes took place in society. Amid the uncertainty and injustice that took place in the Roman society, Christianity grew and exploded so that within two hundred years it displaced all of the other various forms of belief and religion. Had the people of God remained within their own capabilities, the Christian faith would have continued to whither. When challenges took place, faith enabled Christians to serve and transform the world.

This, of course, is the good news and the bad news for the institution of the Church today. We have had a period of being central to the culture and belief of western civilization. Increasingly, with each generation, a change is taking place in the way Christ's love is communicated. It must adapt to the changes in the way people communicate. Our challenge is not to make the gospel more "saleable", but to make it clearer and more honest about Christ's message of love. As need explodes, and it always does, the love of God will be heard and welcomed.

In order to have faith that is strong and relevant to today, we need to act on our faith. In the church we are doing so with studies of institutionalized racism ("White Fragility") and focusing more upon actively serving Christ in the needs of our community. Faith grows when it is moving and especially when it is challenged. The point is not so much to seek difficulties, but to be increasingly present in ways that show Christ's love for people who are struggling. If we are open to the Holy Spirit, God will move us beyond our place of being comfortable, to where faith can grow. In that place, our security is in serving God, and knowing God's love for us. It is also in the place where we become more focused on enabling the things that matter to God are the things that matter to us.

So, we bring our mustard seeds, knowing the power of what is small – when in God's hands – to accomplish what is great. Let's pray to see what God will challenge us to accomplish today.

What is this and what does it have to do with us?

Summer is improvement and repair time in Wisconsin. Our church is no exception. The projected costs of our plans for this summer's work is about \$43,000. Safety – Safety in our parking lot for our walkers and drivers will be improved when cracks are fixed, potholes are patched, and lines are repainted.

October 6 - World Communion Sunday Event


This Sunday, October 6, we will have an opportunity to come together, to connect in fellowship and support. Out of these connections we can reach out to people in need in our community and the world.

Woven Heart Fleece Scarf Supplies:

- 1/3 yard of two colors of fleece (if you make the pieces a tad shorter you can get by with 1/4 yard of each)
 For a complete
- For a complete no-sew scarf, you will need to glue the last two hearts together
- *or* optional 2 buttons, thread & needle

Braided Edge Fleece Scarf Supplies:

- Two colors of fleece (approx. 1/4 yard of each)
- 60 inches by 6-8 inches



Ruffled Scarf Supplies:

Adult

- Two colors of fleece
- Measure an existing scarf whose dimensions you like
- Add 9cm to the width measurement and divide in half to calculate the width of the panels you'll need to cut

Child

- finished measurements of roughly 22cm x 160cm (8 3/4" x 24")
- Cut 2 panels each measuring 15cm x 160cm. (6" x 24")



10:30 – Noon, Wednesdays beginning October 9


