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Reflections

"A Resolution and Hope for the New Year"

¹¹May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully ¹²giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. ¹³He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, ¹⁴in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

Colossians 1:11-14

Most New Year's resolutions have to do with the "outside" in our lives, that we will exercise more, eat less, work harder, and in other ways do the things we know we ought to do. However, we aren't really committed to doing these things, or else we wouldn't be resolving to do them in the New Year! One area worthy of making a special effort, that influences all our lives, is our inner strength. Many things we do, that we wish later we hadn't, stem from weakness in our inner sense of self. We try to gain strength from external things, whether it be eating, drinking, or those trophies that we place in our lives (possessions, trendy items, etc.). If we had more inner strength and personal sense of who we are in Christ, we would be empowered to make more healthy decisions.

What trips us up in our relationships, our commitments and our values are not the "sprints" but the marathons. We can handle the brief bouts of adversity and even feel very good about how we dealt with that one short conflict or temptation. What gets us is - time.

There was a woman whose co-worker caused so much turmoil that she was thinking of quitting the job that she liked in every other way. The issue was the condescending attitude, from her co-worker, that caused her to react with contempt. There was never a single "thing", but it was persistent. After two years, it was causing this woman to really dislike the person she was becoming in order to deal with her coworker. Some time ago this woman made the decision to add some daily practices to combat the issue - prayer, a devotional written for difficult relationships, and meditation. When you are in a difficult relationship, you can't change the other people, but you can do something about yourself. She has been consistent in her practices and three months later, the rewards are now driving the practice. When she slacks off, she feels it, and she loses her "armor of light." Working on our own personal growth is much more rewarding than focusing on adding new activities that we hope will make us feel good about ourselves. Consider some inner exercises.

We don't have to take on major activities or practices. A great place to begin is resolving to start each morning with a time of praying for the people we anticipate meeting in the day, particularly the places where there may be specific needs like grief, sadness, fear, or conflict. Praying mainly for people who trouble us, challenge us, or cause us to be uncomfortable for five minutes each day has a remarkable ability to change us and to support healing for them. Consider a daily reading or exercise that will redirect your attitude or focus for the day.

It's a new year. This is a good time to celebrate all that is new by opening ourselves to God doing something new within us. Working to improve the inside tends to make it much easier to do things about all that is external.

Questions:

What does our baptism mean to us now that we are grown up and older? How does our baptism continue to be a source of new life? If Jesus was sinless what does his baptism mean for us? What is the difference between God sending Jesus to stand with sinners and God being a punishing judge? How does the love and compassion of Jesus enable us to grow in our faith? What does it mean to worship Christ who was humble and accepting of people who were flawed and challenged?

Sermon: "God's Promise to Know Us"

Theme: God's love is a present strength to all those who open their hearts to the loving

kindness and compassion that God wants to share through us to all people.

Purpose: The Congregation will examine and open themselves in their trust in God's loving

care for them.

John 1:29-42 Jesus' call of his disciples knowing their strengths and

weaknesses.

Questions:

distractions.


Scriptures: Isaiah 9:1-4 God will shine a light to all people which will lead to hope



These hymns in question were unfamiliar to Presbyterian congregations when the "new blue" hymnal appeared in 1990. Had churches never adopted that resource, these songs – and many others would have remained outside the shared worship life of PC(USA) congregations. Over the last decades of the twentieth century and the first decades of the twenty-first century, the field of church music has witnessed an unprecedented outpouring of creativity. Who among us, would presume to "quench the Spirit" (1 Thess. 5:19}, bolting the sanctuary doors against fresh inspiration under the assumption that the old hymns and songs are all we need? Like our parents, grandparents, and great-grandparents who lived to see the advent of new hymnals we can face such times of transition with eagerness and confidence. We can do so because we firmly believe, to cite again A Brief Statement of Faith that "the same Spirit who inspired the prophets and apostles" continues to "Rule our life and faith."

Financial Update

We are excited to share our finances at this half-year point in our fiscal year. The shift of our fiscal and programming year to begin and end at the end of June has made it much easier to see how our year has been progressing. There is much to share and to appreciate how we are doing.

Our anticipated budget put us with a projected deficit of \$19,000. However, we have surpassed our expectations and are currently breaking-even in our income and expenditures. Ordinarily, we would have had to withdraw money from reserves by this time of the year. At this writing, we still have a healthy balance in the operating funds!

Our reserves and assets have also been doing well with our investments and use of other income (Head Start classroom rental and other miscellaneous income), so our cash position at this point is a positive \$182,00 compared to last year, at \$146,000. These funds allow us to balance our expenditures with our income.

Much of what has changed over the past few years, is the increase in donations through online giving, electronic funds transfers (EFT), and other planned giving. We have moved to a point where approximately 65% of our pledges and giving occurs through some type of electronic giving. As a result, we haven't experienced the peaks and valleys of financial support, as we have in the past. Our hope is to see continued growth in electronic giving. It is truly the easiest and most convenient way for people to be consistent in their giving.

Capital Campaign

Highlights over the past six months have been in the outcome of our Capital Campaign and its support.

The remaining \$4,480 will come from our general funds.

The support from many congregation members has enabled us to do significant work on the facility to keep it up to date without having to draw from reserves or from reducing our money for our general mission and ministry.

Financial Update (continued)

Mission Giving

We are excited to see a significant increase in our congregation's activity and participation in Mission, over the past six months. Specific designated funds we have disbursed include the following:

Geller funds (\$9,500)

- Presbyterian Disaster Assistance \$4,000 (in two disbarments to support Hurricane Dorian relief)
- Solution Center \$2,500
- Arc of Fond du Lac \$1,000
- Loaves and Fishes \$750
- St. Vincent de Paul \$750
- NAMI \$500

Church's General budget money - \$3,000

- Thanksgiving meals for non-residents at Mental Health Center/Angel Tree \$1,000
- South Sudan \$1,000
- Advocap Family needs and/or summer programs \$1,000

These funds do not include the special offerings and other designated mission money given through the church. Through these offerings we are pleased to have seen an increase in participation with the church in Advocap, connection with Leisa Wagstaff (PCUSA worker in South Sudan), Solution Center, and other missions in the community. We are excited to see this increase as we continue to develop more connections with local services in Fond du Lac.

Our overall financial outcome can be described as "better than anticipated." One area we feel needs further explanation and information is Per Capita giving. Not all members understand that we pay \$37.00 per member, to the denomination. Some members prefer that we simply take their Per Capita portion from their regular giving. In the past, some congregants have made an additional gift to cover the Per Capita costs. That additional gift has decreased by about \$8,000, this year!

The purpose of the Per Capita system is to identify the costs of supporting the work of the General Assembly, Synod (Lakes and Prairies) and the Presbytery (Winnebago). In our region, our Presbytery Per Capita has been used to support programs such as Fall Camp (which has been appreciated by our Youth), outreach to the Presbytery of Uruba in Columbia, and the Presbytery's support for our licensing for music. Other Synod benefits are Synod school and other resources available to support small churches in our region. General Assembly provides a wide range of resources on developing giving, professional direction, and guidance in operation. Per Capita maintains our connection and relationships as a church.

Thank you to all who support FDL Presbyterian ministry

Above all we want to express our gratitude to everyone who supports the work of our congregation. We are able to faithfully serve Jesus, Our Savior, in the lives of individuals and families through our consistent and committed giving of money, time, and creativity that enables us to maintain effective worship, faith development, and mission work. We are grateful for all of the time and effort that creates a powerful force in serving Christ together.
