Christians Serving, Learning and Loving

“Love Those with Whom You Disagree”

43 ‘You have heard that it was said, “You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.” 44But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, 45so that you may be children of your Father in heaven; for he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the righteous and on the unrighteous. 46For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have? Do not even the tax-collectors do the same? 47And if you greet only your brothers and sisters, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the same? 48Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect.

Matthew 5:43-48

It is not mature, healthy, or in any way a sign of knowing God when you are in perpetual conflict with others. Holding radical points of view that are in a continuous discord with the community, may be a sign of displaced hostility and unresolved personal issues, rather than being “strong.” In short, we need to recognize that a great deal of what is happening in our society, our nation, and often in our own families is a sign of sickness rather than having “strong” beliefs. This is particularly the case because those with whom we disagree are not our enemy! The damage being done by the constant fighting and rancor is the real threat. It’s time we recognize that mature, thoughtful, intelligent Christians can disagree without creating enemies or fostering divisions.

A frequent pattern, that you may have encountered, is a person who feels the need to be highly confrontational, who wants you to share their emotional turmoil, who has an “you’re either for me or against me” point of view. Or *you* may be the one living in this pattern of going from fight to fight, battle to battle. This is not the way we are made to live. Worse yet, what we are all suffering from, to some degree, is transference of anger and fear. To some degree, we are all dealing with a sense of a lack of control and anxiety about the future.

The cure to this, is the kind of love that Jesus was teaching, in the passage above. The scripture enables us to see that even though we disagree and see things very differently, we are not enemies.

Unfortunately, there is a tendency for some to enlarge the fear, to increase the division, and to create greater alienation. Sadly, this is what some are trying to do in our politics. Generally, in polling an issue, 85% of the population has similar points of view, and 15% have views that fall outside of the main thinking. So, 85% may agree in justice, fairness, and kindness. Within that 85% there will be varying emphasis and points of view, but on major points of view, rights and beliefs, we could work together. However, what has become the general practice is to pit points of view against one another in false choices. (For example, you can simultaneously be concerned for the serious issue of shootings of young men of color, while also being supportive and concerned for the dangers and stress of law enforcement. And frankly, if you don’t believe that both issues are significant, you aren’t seeing the whole picture.) When we approach our discussions and our differences, with love and respect for the people who oppose our point of view, we discover that we have much more in common than what separates us. More importantly, we can disagree on a great deal yet work together on what is important.

Unfortunately, this call for understanding and maturity is counter to the means by which people have learned to seek attention, in our culture today. Being radical has been normalized to the point that if someone isn’t getting enough reaction or generating enough conflict, they feel the need to push harder. We truly need to work on learning the principles that Jesus taught, of leading with love and understanding, rather than putting up impenetrable shields of animosity and hurling insults in order to weaken our enemies.

Let’s work to learn to be the people Christ calls us to be, especially when we disagree.

What causes people to be more focused on their own will and desires rather than on what would truly be fulfilling and joyful?

03/08/2020 Second Sunday of Lent

Sermon: "God's Call to a New Place"

Theme: We are called to a new, better life of wholeness, healthy relationships, love, and peace.

Purpose: We will commit to changes that will open us to new possibilities of relationship with God and others.

Scriptures: Genesis 12:1-4 God calls Abram to leave behind his family and home to a new land that God will show him.

John 3:1-17 Jesus' conversation with Nicodemus the Pharisee at night.

Questions:

What do we need to be willing to leave behind in order to move to a healthier place in our faith and relationship with God? What does it mean for us to be "Born from above" and how do we participate with God in our rebirth? In what ways is Nicodemus' question "how can a person be reborn when they have grown old" describe our own sense of being unable to change? How do we open ourselves to the "water" and the "Spirit" to act in our lives in a new way? What is the difference between being faithful and being transformed by the power of God's Holy Spirit?

03/15/2020 Third Sunday of Lent

Sermon: "Our Continued Struggle"

Theme: We are made strong to overcome our challenges of superficiality and selfishness through drawing from God's grace and sustaining love.

Purpose: We will examine ways to remain strong in our path of growth and transformation.

Scriptures: Exodus 17:1-7 The people of Israel quarrel with Moses and complain that they do not have water.

Romans 5:1-11 We are justified through faith, God's love is proved to us that while we were sinners Christ died.

Questions:

What are we making harder in our relationships than really needs to be? In what ways are we caught up in our emotional and personal issues? How is it our ego is causing us to live a less fulfilling and joyful life? In what ways do the experiences and challenges we experience enable us to know God more fully? How do we move from being resistant to seeing God in our hard times to becoming people who become closer to God through our difficult times?

03/22/2020 Fourth Sunday of Lent Leisa Wagstaff from South Sudan

Sermon: "Choosing the Light"

Theme: We choose to listen to God's direction and gifts rather than return to our need for control or comfort.

Purpose: The congregation will renew their commitment to listening to God's call upon their lives.

Scriptures: Ephesians 5:8-14 Be people of the light, take no part in the works of darkness.
John 9:1-41 Jesus heals a man born blind, the conflict with the Pharisees who cannot accept the healing.

Questions:

What is blinding us from seeing the possibilities of God's presence and power in the world around us? In what ways do we miss God's grace and power because of our perceptions and judgments? How do we release our need for control and our false over confidence in order to see God's movement in the world around us? What do we need to do in order to be part of God's light coming into the world, rather than to be locked in our own limited points of view?

03/29/2020 Fifth Sunday of Lent

Sermon: "Revived When Hope is Lost"

Theme: God restores our strength if we will wait upon Jesus' love and compassion for us.

Purpose: We will draw strength from listening to God's direction and presence.

Scriptures: Ezekiel 37:1-14 The valley of dry bones, Ezekiel's promise that God will raise again those who were in despair.
John 11:1-45 The raising of Lazarus, the brother of Mary and Martha, from the dead.

Questions:

In what ways does our faith and relationship with God need to be "raised from the dead?" How is it we have given up expectation that God can do something different in our lives? What is necessary so that we can be people who see Jesus' deep love and care for us even though circumstances are not going as we would hope? How do we live faithfully when we do not see how God's promises might be fulfilled? What is our role in being the ones to whom Jesus is coming to do a miracle? How do we live as people who expect God to act rather than to be overwhelmed by our fears and despair?

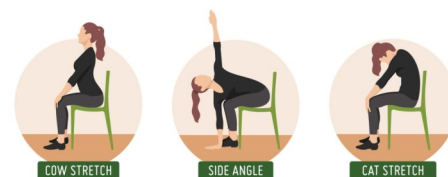

- 70% of children between the ages of six and seventeen have never set foot inside a classroom
- 25% of the school age population is enrolled in school
- 90% of teachers are untrained

The headteachers and teachers are so eager to learn. Coming together for an occasional training is such a big highlight for them. It seems they are inspired by just knowing that their school isn't the only one without basic needs such as chalk and teacher salaries. They arrive punctually for trainings, despite the culture of lateness, with excitement and heartfelt thanks for being given the opportunity.

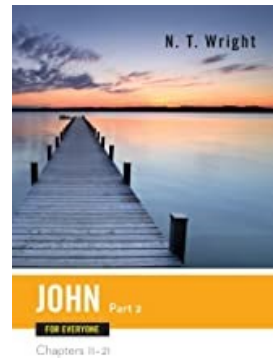
Their evaluation of the trainings has moved beyond an “everything was good” to one of empowerment and understanding. They identify their needs that, if met, will help them become better school administrators, educators, facilitators of trauma reduction and conflict resolution, mobilizers of parents and the school community, and promoters of wholistic development.” – Leisa Wagstaff

Embracing the Uncertain: A Lenten Study for Unsteady Times

Just turning on the news lets us know we are living in uncertain times. Economic instabilities, eruptions of violence, and natural catastrophes can alter the lives and landscapes of entire communities. Our individual lives are often just as unsteady: relationships can break, plans can falter, and confidence can fail.

Uncertainty can definitely be uncomfortable. Many of us prefer stability and a predictable future to an unknown fate. We are wired to want to control our destiny.

The reality is that in our fast-changing, unpredictable world there are few guarantees in life. It's those who are willing to embrace uncertainty and make the risky decision to follow Jesus despite the many "unknowns" who will reap the greatest rewards.

During Lent we will engage and wrestle with life's uncertainties, not ignore them. The first six chapters focus on six post-Transfiguration, pre-Passion stories in the Gospels. Each of these stories are signposts in the gospel narrative, pointing down at a world filled with uncertainty, but pointing us forward to a cross that can show us how to follow Jesus with courage, hope and obedience.
