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Reflections

"The Power of Contentment"

⁶Of course, there is great gain in godliness combined with contentment; ⁷for we brought nothing into the world, so that we can take nothing out of it; ⁸but if we have food and clothing, we will be content with these. ⁹But those who want to be rich fall into temptation and are trapped by many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. ¹⁰For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, and in their eagerness to be rich some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pains.

1 Timothy 6:6-10

Recently, it has become apparent that much of the rage and hostility in our world is a result of jealousy and envy. For any number of reasons, some people feel they have been cheated out of a better life. Frequently, their anger is focused on groups, ideologies, or other "blameworthy" targets. That mentality is often expressed as rage. The problems they experience are because "fill in the blank group" has taken all the resources and left them without as much as they think they should have gotten. This is a pattern that, once established, tends to feed upon itself and can get entirely out of control. The result is a mindset that is obsessed with perceived enemies and perceived threats. This is the type of mentality that some have sought to exploit to fuel various movements, throughout history. That mindset always ends in disaster for those who are participating.

The practice of "contentment" is an emotion on which we rarely focus. Besides easing the dangers of envy and jealousy, contentment is a powerful source for joy and inner peace. Contentment helps us adopt practices that help us appreciate what we have. It is, in effect, an act of gratitude; intentionally rejoicing about the fact that we have all we need.

For example, when bringing home groceries, what do we think about the process? Frequently, we grumble that we must carry in the bags. Worse yet, we may have to make multiple trips. Then there is all the time putting the food away. That can be aggravating because we may have to rearrange the cupboards to make everything fit. More irritation; more work.

The mindset of contentment should be to appreciate the abundance that has been provided to us and to realize that we have been greatly blessed. God has given you the blessing of wealth and sufficiency. Taking time to recognize the blessing is a gift of "practical worship" that keeps us in a mind of contentment.

Similarly, paying bills should also be a process of giving thanks for what each of the bills represent: light, warmth, water, home, etc. There is often great anxiety in bill-paying for those who are dealing with tight budgets. However, intentionally focusing on what has been provided to us, can go a long way to offset the way we see the world, when we have financial worries.

The whole process of contentment is to remind us that money is the way God provides for our needs. We do not worship money by emotionally and spiritually dwelling in envy or craving more. We dwell in the place of looking around us and saying, "thank you for the blessings we enjoy." We give thanks for each meal recognizing that God has provided it. And, we practice the enjoyment of realizing that 'sufficient' is not just good, it's actually just what we need.

Per Capita

In the Presbyterian Church USA system of governance, each member of the congregation is assessed a *per capita* amount to support the work of the church through its three governing levels.

The per capita money is divided as follows:

Winnebago Presbytery - 66% Winnebago Presbytery - 66% Synod of Lakes & Prairies - 14% General Assembly (the national ruling body) - 20%

This per capita covers the cost of operating these three separate entities, various committees and commissions, along with funding the annual General Assembly Meeting.

Our congregation has supported this assessment as an appropriate way to assist in helping to meet the needs of our denomination.

For 2021, the per capita amount is \$37.00 for each church member. First Presbyterian Church will pay this amount regardless of whether you contribute. The per capita amount is a separate charge from the money you have pledged, to the church, for its operations.



The Transition Team was created, by Session, to guide our congregation through the pandemic journey.

Up to this point we:

- are learning how to fully use the technology available to us
- are involving people of all ages in our on-line worship services
- have created Thanksgiving and Christmas Eve videos with the help of Pastor Jack and volunteers from our congregation
- are working on how to safely return to in-person worship based on CDC and WI Dept. of Health recommendations
- participated in a webinar entitled "The Virus and the Vaccine: What You Need to Know" sponsored by the Winnebago and Milwaukee Presbyteries and presented by Lisa Allgood, the Executive Presbyter of Cincinnati Presbytery, a Ruling Elder, and a trained immunocytochemist.

We learned:

- COVID-19 is 3 times more infectious than other respiratory viruses
- All 50 states are experiencing spikes higher than previously seen
- 40% of those who are infected are asymptomatic, but they are still infectious (they don't know it and neither do you)
- For those who are infected and will go on to develop symptoms, they are more highly infectious for up to 8 days before symptoms emerge (so again they don't know they are infectious and neither do you)
- Vaccine rollout is slower than anticipated in the US
- The majority of the population will not likely be vaccinated before the middle of this year (June-August)
- Presbytery STRONGLY urges churches to stay virtual right now

Dear Friends,

There is an impending crisis in our community, and you may be able to help.

There are many people who have lost their jobs because of the pandemic. Those needing assistance with rent and/or utility bills has more than double, compared to last year. We have at least 10 families in Fond du Lac county who are living in their cars. When the eviction moratorium ends, there will be a deluge of families on the streets because they are seriously behind on rent or mortgage payments. We will also see many families without heat or electricity because they cannot pay their utility bills. Our local serving agencies, whose services are already stretched, will be unable to help those in need.

Congress has passed another COVID-19 relief package which provides all tax filers with income below \$75,000 with a \$600 stimulus check. If you thought this money should have been directed toward those who are in greater need, or if you would just like to help , we have an opportunity to make that happen. Please consider passing a portion, *or all*, of your stimulus money to St. Vincent DePaul. SVDP can place your money where it is needed the most .

St. Vincent DePaul is well known for caring for people in the community. Its staff includes 30 to 40 volunteers that work with local families. SVDP also works with other charities such as the Solution Center and the Salvation Army helping with rent, utilities or whatever is needed to keep people in their homes. **One Hundred Percent of the donated money goes to help those in need, as there are no administrative fees!**
