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Reflections

A Fast of Compassion and Healing

- ⁶ Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?
- 7 Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin?
- ⁸ Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the Lord shall be your rearguard.
- ⁹ Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am.

Isaiah 58:6-9

It is somewhat strange to come into the season of Lent. Last year, during this season, is when our entire pandemic exile began. I was reading an essay by a woman who was describing her struggle with how to come into Lent when her family had already given up so much during the year, let alone the season. She was saying that it's been like a yearlong season of Lent. So how do we make this a useful time?

It might help to back up and examine the purpose of this season. Lent is a time for working on deepening our relationship with Christ Jesus and opening ourselves to new growth as Christians. It really is supposed to be a gift we give to ourselves for our own renewal and restoration. The practice of Fasting on Lent, whether it be a day or giving up items, are intended to create space in our lives that we can then fill with something better. A spiritual "cleaning out our closets" so that we can be free of habits and unfulfilling ways of living. What we choose to give up is not a sacrifice for God's benefit. It is what will move us and challenge us.

Isaiah was speaking to people who struggled with how to move from rituals that were about finding comfort in slavery, to experiencing the grace of God that liberates and frees us. The people to whom Isaiah was speaking were slaves, but they were also guilty of enslaving others. They suffered oppression, but their attitudes and hostility were oppressive to their own family and to their neighbors.

We tend to see and focus on the things which are wrong in this world: gross injustice, waste, lack of compassion, arrogance, bitterness, and violence. However, we do not have the ability to change the way others act or think. What we do have, this Lenten season, is an opportunity to focus on our own thinking and our own frame of mind. We recognize what is wrong in the world and we participate, in our own minds and hearts, in judgment, attack, blame, and guilt. Rather than focus on what we can't change change, what we are invited to do is to use this Lenten season to work on what we can change within us, and to seek healing for our own source of hostility and unforgiveness.

The practices that we are sharing are one way to open our hearts and minds to a gift of renewal. You can find a copy of the materials on our website which you may use on your own.

We are called by God to be in fellowship with Him and with one another. We can't do that very well if we are filled with the noise and bitterness of past grievances and wounds. We can't do much about what is happening in the world, especially when we have the same battles and oppression, that is happening in so many places, in our own hearts. So, now is a good time to start. Welcome to the season of your renewal.

Message: We are tired of meaningless living.

Theme: We open ourselves to God moving us from our prison of bitterness and despair as

we affirm that we need Jesus to work within us to transform us.

Purpose: We will practice letting go.

Practice: Awareness that we live in the past.

Scriptures: Proverbs 30:1-9 Weary of foolishness, wanting to know the Lord

and wisdom.

Matthew 4:1-11 The Temptation of Jesus

Ouestions:

What causes us to be burned out and weary? How do we deal with feelings of dissatisfaction with our circumstances and our lives? How do we move from focusing on what is not satisfying to rediscovering our true joy in Christ? What causes us to be unhappy with our current state of living? In what ways will engaging in practices of fasting and prayer give us direction to change our lives? What do we need to do in order to begin to learn new direction for our mind and our soul?

02/28/2021 2nd Sunday of Lent

Sermon: "God Promises to Walk with Us"

Theme: God is always with us through trails and suffering, and leads us to grow in wis-

dom, confidence, and lasting peace.

Purpose: We will see that the covenant grows through hardships.

Scriptures: Genesis 17:1-7, 15-16 God calls Abram to walk with God and to enter a covenant.

Questions:

What does it mean for us to "walk with God?" Why are we surprised that we experience trials and difficulties? How much of our worry and hurt is because of our perceptions and beliefs rather than the reality of our experiences? What is the benefit of sharing with God a love for the world?

Safe Plan to Return to In-Person Worship

When:

Vaccination rates are 70-85+%

Viral Transmission

- Cases <1/100K
- Positive Tests <5%

Then:

Implement our hybrid, phased plan to return

- Face masks mandatory
- Physical distancing
- Low-touch environment
- Outdoors or increased air exchange
- Shortened time of service
- No or minimized singing
- Focus on sanitizing high-touch surfaces
- Sign-in with sanitized pens, track attendance
- Have a fallback plan for outbreaks
- Communication plan
