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Reflections

Called to Freedom ... But -

¹³ For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. ¹⁴For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' ¹⁵If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another. Galatians 5:13-15

There are times when we need to assert ourselves, to be direct in our communication and advocate for ourselves. However, if we are pushing for an ego booster, fighting to be first in line, or acting out of selfishness, then any gain we may receive will be harmful. We see this repeatedly when people have been "fighting" for their right to not be restrained by laws or directions that are intended to benefit the common good.

There are many times when individuals have needed to go to their employer and argue for a raise. They bring evidence of their pay in comparison to others, what they could receive if they worked elsewhere, and their continued work history. That type of self-advocacy does not diminish anyone and, when in a listening mode, the employee may learn what is missing from their performance to better insure a raise (or employment elsewhere), in the future. Or, they may make their point and see financial benefit. This is an example of advocating while maintaining a "love of neighbor."

Unfortunately, we are seeing a repeated pattern of selfish egos and personal attacks that lead to meaningless conflict. Several times I have heard people say, "I thought this was America!" as they push for an individual behavior without considering how their behavior will impact others. The Constitution begins, "We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity..." The foundation of our country is not about being able to force your will on others, but being able to negotiate freedom in a way that benefits the common good, and *especially* to do no harm to one's neighbor.

To put it another way: wear the mask. Maintain the social distance. If you are not emotionally attached, or intellectually convinced, of the severity of the pandemic, then do it because you believe in Christ Jesus and what the bible teaches. Unless directed otherwise by a physician, get the vaccine when you are able. There is more than enough documentation to show that it is safe and effective.

It isn't about personal liberty, or about political power, or even about individual freedom. It is about whether you are going to be loving towards your neighbor, as instructed by Jesus and the bible. Or whether you are going to be a servant of egotistical selfishness. This is one of the few times when it isn't that tough. We show our faith in Christ in the way we treat others. Preventing them from dying is clearly the loving thing to do.

Sermon: "God Promises to Correct Us"

Theme: As we open our hearts to the wisdom of the cross, we are corrected from the

foolishness which leads to so much alienation and brokenness in the world.

Purpose: We will examine how the suffering of the cross calls us to wisdom in our

relationships.

Scriptures: 1 Corinthians 1:18-25 The cross is foolishness to those who are perishing,

but the wisdom of God is a strength for those who are

open to learning.

John 2:13-22 Jesus drives out the money changers and cleanses the

temple.

Questions:

What causes us to endure the same conflicts and issues repeatedly? What do we need to do in order to learn and grow from our suffering? How do we learn wisdom? Why are so many relationships full of turmoil and brokenness? What can we do to be supportive of growing in understanding and compassion? How do we move past the places where we are unable to learn and grow? What needs to be driven out of our life in order that we may move forward?

Wednesday, March 10, 2021

Message: Love and forgiveness are the path to living differently.

Theme: Forgiveness is a practice that has to be learned and embraced in order to

experience the freedom of love and release from personal bondage.

Purpose: To discover practices of forgiveness.

Practice: "I choose forgiveness"

Scriptures: Ephesians 4:17-32 Take off the darkness of sin and put on Christ, do not

allow evil to come out of your mouth.

Matthew 5:21-26, 43-48 Practice forgiveness and release others from their

debts. Love all people and be perfect.

Questions:

Do we really understand what forgiveness means? How do we learn to practice real forgiveness that is liberating and healing? Why do we try and substitute self-restraint and denial for real practices of release and forgiveness? How do we learn to forgive while we allow ourselves to work through our hurt and anger? What is needed in order that we can grow in the practice of forgiveness? How do we experience real power of forgiveness in our lives?

03/14/2021 4th Sunday of Lent

Sermon: "A Promise of Grace"

Theme: God offers us unconditional love that frees us from our prison of sin and bondage

to our past.

Purpose: We will learn to receive grace and practice living by that same grace.

Scriptures: Ephesians 2:1-10 By grace we have been saved, not the results of our

works, but out of kindness in Jesus Christ.

John 3:14-21 The son of Man must be lifted up as the bronze

serpent was lifted in the wilderness. God sent the son

out of love, for salvation.

Questions:

How do we learn to truly practice grace and forgiveness for ourselves, others, and for the world? What does it take to develop ability to not hold onto offenses and accounts of the wrongs that are committed against us? What is the process by which we reorient our minds and our hearts towards letting go of past offenses? What do we need to do to move from being dominated by past memories and resentments to embracing present opportunities for love? What is a true lifestyle of grace?

Wednesday, March 17, 2021

Message: God has given you all you need.

Theme God has already provided us what we need to be joyful and fulfilled as we learn to

rejoice and give thanks for the gifts that we have already received.

Purpose: We will shift our focus from envy and jealousy to gratitude.

Practice: Gratitude instead of grievance.

Scripture: 1 Corinthians 10:6-13 We must not put Christ to the test but hold onto the

faithfulness of God.

John 8:12-20 Jesus was teaching that he is the light of the world,

whoever walks with him is never in darkness.

Questions:

How does envy and jealousy cause us to think that what we lack is outside of ourselves? In what ways do we convince ourselves to stay in a rut because of things that are outside of our control? How does our perception of lack and our sense of suffering disadvantage cause us to be unable to embrace opportunities to experience love and peace? How is it that our fear comes to dominate our spiritual life? What do we need to do to see ourselves as blessed with possibilities for joy and wholeness?

May 1 - Scholarships

Guidelines for all Scholarships:

- 2. Recipient must have demonstrated a commitment to the church. This commitment has been defined as meeting the following criteria in the past calendar year:
- church worship attendance a minimum of twice in the past calendar year
- nurturing faith development in an activity of the Serving, Loving or Learning Teams (educational opportunities, mission activities, virtual worship participation, virtual coffee hour, bingo, etc.) at least twice in the past calendar year.
- Recipient is enrolled in an accredited college or university.

When:

Vaccination rates are 70-85+% Viral Transmission

- Cases <1/100K
- Positive Tests <5%

Then:

Implement our hybrid, phased plan to return

- Face masks mandatory
- Physical distancing
- Low-touch environment
- Outdoors or increased air exchange
- Shortened time of service
- No or minimized singing
- Focus on sanitizing high-touch surfaces
- Sign-in with sanitized pens, track attendance
- Have a fallback plan for outbreaks
- Communication plan

One Great Hour of Sharing - A History

Did you know that One Great Hour of Sharing was founded in 1946 by Henry Knox Sherril? The goal was to raise one million dollars in one hour for World Relief. In 1949, church leaders worked together to promote this. A show called "One Great Hour" was broadcasted on major networks. The show featured President Truman and popular musicians and actors of the time.

One Great Hour of Sharing releases stories about a fish named Gracie to educate children about disaster relief, poverty, and hunger. These are all major targets for OGHS. Using fish banks are a fun way to get children to interact and see that they can make a difference. The reason we do fish banks is because of the symbolism between fish and Jesus: Jesus multiplied fish to feed the people. World hunger is a focus one of One Great Hour of Sharing.


