Reflections

How to Be Angry and Healthy

⁵ Commit your way to the Lord; trust in him, and he will act.

⁶ He will make your vindication shine like the light, and the justice of your cause like the noonday.

⁷ Be still before the Lord, and wait patiently for him; do not fret over those who prosper in their way, over those who carry out evil devices.

⁸ Refrain from anger, and forsake wrath. Do not fret—it leads only to evil. ⁹ For the wicked shall be cut off, but those who wait for the Lord shall inherit the land.

Psalm 37:5-9

In one of our recent Lenten Practice Workshops, we talked about how anger impacts our relationships with God and with others. This was in the context of speaking about the challenges of learning and practicing forgiveness. It is important to note that being angry is not a sin, it's to be expected. Anger is a reaction to what we experience. Some of our experiences are misperceptions; other experiences are exaggerated. Some experiences are accurate perceptions of what is wrong. Anger is natural, but what we do with the anger is what separates a mature and wise person from someone who is foolish and vulnerable to self-destruction.

Part of the problem is that we need to learn how to have the strength and capability to deal with anger before it occurs. Denial and self-distraction can only go so far in reducing our reactions or "keeping our cool." It becomes a question of our width of perception and our depth of understanding of the risks and issues. Anger has a way of narrowing our focus, physically and mentally. When we are very angry, we tend to be solely focused on what we perceive to be the problem. Then, we are unable to see other resources around us for dealing with that problem. At times this causes us to seriously misjudge the situation. When we are upset and angry, we tend to become focused on our own needs. At times moving into a "survival at all costs" way of thinking. If later, we discover that the threat wasn't what we thought it was, it can lead to humiliation and difficulty in mending relationships.

Those who "Wait upon the Lord" and work to practice widening their awareness through intercession and gratitude are less likely to be caught up in a narrow vision, or to be caught up in survival thinking. Those who have developed a sense of confidence in God's steadfast love and are secure in their identity, as a beloved child of God, do not feel that it is up to them to fight every battle. They can see themselves in relationship to a larger picture of what is happening when there are problems.

The Psalmist, in the passage above, is wise in distinguishing the difference between people who are caught up in wrath and emotion, and those who can draw understanding and strength from their knowledge of God. That's why we do this entire time of Lent. It enables us to have a foundation of peace and security that steadies us and enables us to be wise in dealing with the many challenges we may face. Take time during these last weeks before Easter to find the strength that will sustain you through all the year.

Pandemic Update from the Transition Team

Frequently asked questions:

1. When will we come back together for worship?

At the current rate of vaccination, we hope to have some in-person gatherings as early as July. This will be based on the following 7-day average statistics for Fond du Lac County:

Vaccination rates at 70-85+% ("Herd Immunity") (The following statistics are signs that the vaccines are outpacing the variants.) Viral Transmission Cases <1/100K Positive Tests <5%

2. When can other groups get together?

(Coffee Hour, Meals, Fellowship Groups, Meetings, Study Groups)

Due to the duration of these meetings, the probable closer contact, and method of presentation (i.e. circle vs. lecture), there is increased risk of infection. These groups will be able to meet:

When staff and their families have been vaccinated. When the standards stated above have been met. When we have demonstrated successful and safe practices during in-person worship services.

3. Other churches are having worship, why can't we?

We are committed to following the guidelines from the WI Department of Health and the Wisconsin Council of Churches for determining when it is safe. We believe the church to be more than the building and do not wish to risk lives and our community to return to in-person gatherings too soon. We offer a prayer of thanksgiving for the resources we have, the belief in the resilience of the church body and that God is at work during these uncertain times.

We thank you for your continued prayers, patience, and support. We pray that you can safely connect with family and friends and take time to relax. Stay tuned for more questions and answers.



- 2. Recipient must have demonstrated a commitment to the church. This commitment has been defined as meeting the following criteria in the past calendar year:
- church worship attendance a minimum of twice in the past calendar year
- nurturing faith development in an activity of the Serving, Loving or Learning Teams (educational opportunities, mission activities, virtual worship participation, virtual coffee hour, bingo, etc.) at least twice in the past calendar year.
- Recipient is enrolled in an accredited college or university.

Vaccination rates are 70-85+% Viral Transmission - Cases <1/100K

- Positive Tests <5%

Then:

Implement our hybrid, phased plan to return

- Face masks mandatory
- Physical distancing
- Low-touch environment
- Outdoors or increased air exchange
- Shortened time of service
- No or minimized singing
- Focus on sanitizing high-touch surfaces
- Sign-in with sanitized pens, track attendance
- Have a fallback plan for outbreaks


