Reflections

"Healthy Parting"

- ²² The Lord spoke to Moses, saying: ²³Speak to Aaron and his sons, saying, Thus you shall bless the Israelites: You shall say to them,
- ²⁴ The Lord bless you and keep you;
- ²⁵ the Lord make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you;
- ²⁶ the Lord lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace.
- ²⁷ So they shall put my name on the Israelites, and I will bless them.

Numbers 6:22-27

I want to share some thoughts about the coming weeks and the end of my ministry at First Presbyterian Church. Deb and I have felt, for a very long time, that we want to be closer to our children. Our lives have felt to be very out-of-balance as a result. The long separation from our children, because of the pandemic, intensified those feelings. My style and manner of doing ministry is to be fully and deeply engaged. I tend to be deeply attached to the work and am not good at reducing those connections incrementally. A change is really needed for us to move forward.

This is a good time for the church to be thinking about its future, as well. The church has emerged from the pandemic financially strong and in good spiritual health. Right now, it has more options than resources. The church needs to rediscover the call of where Christ is seeking energy and where its resources need to be dedicated. That needs to be done as a sense of call for the congregation that will take place under a leadership that is better equipped to facilitate that process.

My plans are to focus on my family. My wife and I are looking forward to traveling, spending time with our children and grandchild, and living a more balanced life. As for myself and the congregation, we will need to shift our relationship from me being pastor, to me being part of the church's past. We will talk more about "separation ethic" in the future. Briefly, it means I will not be available, after September, to do any pastoral care or service. In fact, the "gap" that takes place is an important and healthy part of the process of the church's growth and moving forward. It is important that my pastoral role not have any interference in the transition of the church. Instead, care needs and concerns should be directed to the elders of the church, and the new leadership of the congregation.

Parts of this process are awkward because it has been a close and very meaningful relationship. My wife and I have invested deeply in this congregation and are in the process of dealing with those feelings. Many of you are adjusting to the changes in your feelings and attachments connected with us, as well. Let's not fear the process because, in the end, it leads to a healthy place where we can deeply appreciate what God has done in and through us, working together.

08/01/2021 Communion In Person YouTube will be a repeat from last year.

Sermon: Faith or Bread

Theme: We receive the scriptures as a message of God's presence and love that enables us

to trust God in the things we do not know.

Purpose: We will examine how we respond to unknown and uncertain times.

Scriptures: Exodus 16:2-4, 9-15 The Hebrews in the wilderness complain against Moses

and are fed by God with Manna.

John 6:24-35 Jesus chastises the crowds for their want of bread rather

than the food that endures for eternal life.

Questions:

How do we handle when we are uncertain about the future and unclear about how problems will be resolved? Do we trust God to provide for our needs or do we feel like it is up to us to solve our own problems? Do we see challenges and trials as a failure or something to resent or are we able to see through faith opportunities for God to be glorified? Do we live by our bread alone or do we seek the food that is the source of eternal life?

08/08/2021 Congregational Meeting to Dissolve pastoral relationship

Sermon: "What Does Jesus mean by, 'I am...'"

Theme: Jesus speaks to us of drawing our strength and our source of meaning from him

alone, rather than demanding conformity or other obligations.

Purpose: To understand the purpose of Jesus' statements about himself.

Scriptures: 1 Kings 19:4-8 Elijah depressed after his conflict with the Prophets of Baal

and the king and queen.

John 6:35, 41-51 Jesus says, "I am the Bread of Life."

Questions:

What does Jesus mean when he says "I am the bread of life?" In what ways is Jesus meaning to be exclusive of others paths of faith? In what ways is Jesus instructing us to depend upon him? How should we interact with other faiths? When Elijah battled the prophets of Baal was this a theological difference or something else? What difference does it make when some believe differently from ourselves?

08/15/2021

Sermon: "Bread"

Theme: The message of the bread is our sustenance, our wholeness, and our unity. Purpose: To understand that we are united and nurtured by God's call to unity. Scriptures: Ephesians 5:15-20 Do not be foolish, live as those who are wise.

John 6:51-58 Jesus said, "I am the living Bread."

Questions:

How is bread used as a metaphor in the bible? In what ways do we connect with that metaphor? Are there false assumptions we make or misunderstandings we have about bread? What is the difference between "unleavened bread" and leavened bread? What does Jesus mean when he says that he is the "living bread that came down from heaven?" In what way does the history of Manna in the Old Testament influence our understanding of the bible?

Coming Up in Worship (continued)

08/22/2021

Sermon: "Literally or figuratively?"

Theme: We develop a relationship with our heritage that is instructive but not necessarily

directing us to do the same things.

Purpose: To examine how we reform our past into our future.

Scriptures: Joshua 24:1-2a, 14-18 Joshua calls the people to pledge their faithfulness

to God alone.

John 6:56-69 Jesus calls the people to eat his flesh and drink his

blood.

Questions:

How do we know when we should take scripture literally and when it is a metaphor? In what ways do some passages have deeper truths when not taken literally? What tends to make us more biased against some interpretations or less wiling to accept a message from scripture? How do our preconceptions shape our ability to hear the Word of God in its full meaning? What do we need to consider as examine passages that are disturbing or difficult for us?

08/29/2021

Sermon: "Ordinances and Statutes"

Theme: We are called to learn and observe the law of God so that we may practice what is

at the heart of the relationship God desires we develop.

Purpose: To understand how to observe the law of God wisely.

Scriptures: Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-9 Moses calls the people to observe the statutes and

ordinances from God.

Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23 The disciples are confronted by Pharisees regarding

their practices.

Questions:

What do we mean when we speak of the "law of God?" In what ways are we obligated to observe the laws of the Old Testament? In what ways are we not bound by the old laws? How do we know the difference between what was in he past to educate and shape God's people and what we need to observe today? How should we respond to those who continue to call for obedience to Levitical laws? How does God want us to live today in righteousness?

09/05/2021 Labor Day Weekend, Communion

Sermon: Culture and Prejudice

Theme: We recognize that the prejudice and attitudes demonstrated in the bible are not

directive to how we should behave today.

Purpose: We will learn to separate what gives us direction from what was common in the

culture of the past.

Scriptures: James 2:1-10, 14-17 Faith without works is dead. Why do we dishonor

the poor and cater to the wealthy?

Mark 7:24-37 Jesus and the Syrophoenician Woman, and the man

who is deaf.

Questions:

Why did Jesus act in a way that seems so rude to us? Since Jesus was rude to the woman, does that mean we are not expected to be kind to all people? What was the cultural issue that lead to this type of an interchange as happened between Jesus and this woman? Was James' instruction to the people in the church that necessary? Were people seriously showing partiality based upon clothing and appearances? How do we do those same things today? What can we do to be aware of our prejudices that interfere with our mission to share God's love?




